Cape Town Highlights include Table Mountain, Cape Point Nature Reserve and wild flower kingdom, Mosielon wineyards, Robben Island and Nelson Mandela's story. Stylish accommodations and restaurants.

Central Kalahari Game Reserve The second largest game reserve in the world. Many different ecosystems support a huge variety of wildlife, including giraffes, brown hyenas, warthogs, cheetahs, wild dogs, leopards, lions, blue wildebeests, elands, gemsboks, kudus, and red hartebeests.

Chobe National Park Famous for its population of 30,000 elephants, get close to these animals by boat or by vehicle. Choose among elegant lodges within an hour's drive of Victoria Falls.

Etosha National Park Namibia's premier wildlife park is dominated by a large salt pan and spring system. Open four-wheel-drive vehicles with naturalists, day and night drives into the park, track rhinos.

Greater Kruger National Park Private reserves form part of the national park, home to more species of wildlife than any other sanctuary in Africa and the best chance to view the Big Five – elephant, rhino, buffalo, lion, and leopard. Rhino tracking and game walks, day and night drives.

Hwange National Park Zimbabwe's largest national park. Expansive grasslands and woodlands, with game trails leading to water holes and pans. Game viewing in open four-wheel-drive vehicles and game walks reveal the Big Five.

Kafue National Park Flooded grasslands provide a year-round water source, attracting great numbers of grazers and the predators that stalk them, and are the highlight of the park. These marshy areas also provide prime bird habitat for locals and migrants.

Linyanti Characterized by a lagoon system similar to the Okavango. Surrounded by open grassland, riverine forest, and mixed woodland. Game cruising on the Linyanti River on a double-decker boat. Superb birding.

Lower Zambezi National Park The beauty of this park is in its state of absolute wildness. Exploring this park can

be done by canoe, on foot, vehicle, and power boat. The park covers three different habitats, the river is overhung with a thick riverine fringe, while further inland is a floodplain fringed with mopane forest and interspersed with winterborn trees. All of this with the Zambezi escarpment forming a beautiful backdrop.

Madagascar Some of the highest biodiversity in the world. Stunning beaches and coral formations. The island of the lemurs is the only place to see these entrancing, charismatic primates in the wild.

Makgadikgadi Pans A relic of Africa's greatest super lake, where early hominids once roamed offers a comprehensive desert experience. Activities include game walks with bushman trackers, canoe drives, and excursions to remote archaeological sites in the pans.

Mana Pools National Park One of the most beautiful flood plains in all of Africa. Game drives in open four-wheel-drive vehicles with naturalists, canoe safaris, walking safaris, boat excursions and rides on the river. Elephants and buffaloes are a feature, as well as wild dogs, leopards, and lions. Excellent birding opportunities abound.

Mashatu Game Reserve In remote eastern Botswana lies a diverse wilderness of savanna, riverine forests, marshland, open plains and sandstone outcrops, studded with baobab trees. Game drives in open four-wheel-drive vehicles (and mountain bike excursions) with naturalists and trackers reveal elephants, buffaloes, lions, giraffes, elands, and the kori bustards. Archaeological sites include the Mofutsos Ruins and the Pitsani Koppe Boer War sites.

Namib Desert The oldest desert on earth where red sand dunes tower 1,000 feet above Sossusvlei. Beautiful scenery, vast deserts plains and rugged mountains. Game drives with naturalists in open four-wheel-drive vehicles. Desert adapted species like springboks, oryxes, and ostriches.

North and South Luangwa National Parks A complex riverine and lagoon system. More remote and rustic than other parks. Game walks and night drives, as well as portered walking safaris. Game concentrations are rich and feature endemic Thornicroft giraffes, leopards, elephants, hippos, and lions.

Okavango Delta The largest inland delta in the world and an UNESCO World Heritage Site. Pristine and uncrowded. Local community involvement. Open four-wheel-drive vehicles with naturalists, day drives, mokoro and boat excursions, and game walks.

Savuti An arid region in the southern part of the Chobe National Park. Best known for its large number of predators such as lions, leopards, cheetahs, and wild dogs.

Skeleton Coast Desolate, uninhabited terrain, from soaring sand dunes to towering canyons, seals and shipwrecks. Game viewing specialties include rare desert elephants, cape fur seals, brown hyenas, jackals, and ostriches. Visit authentic Himba settlements.

Victoria Falls One of the Seven Wonders of the World. The Zimbabwe or Zambian side of the falls offers a wide variety of luxurious accommodations. Additional activities include pontoon trips above the falls, cultural visits, shopping, and whitewater rafting.

Wildlife A living place of worship and pilgrimage in the isolated mountains of Lasta. The town of Lalibela surrounds eleven famous 12th and 13th-century Christian churches carved out of solid bedrock.

Lamu Island One of the earliest Arab coastal settlements, Lamu has preserved its whitewashed architecture and a tempo reminiscent of the 18th century. The ambience is maintained by the absence of motor vehicles. Donkeys and dhows are still the most common mode of transport. In this UNESCO World Heritage Site, skilled craftsmen create ornate doors and Arab chests, with the blue Indian Ocean as a backdrop.

Mahale Mountains National Park In this mountain range live wild chimpanzees, behind a white tented safari camp set on the white sand beaches of Lake Tanganyika. Within an hour or two of tracking from camp, you can be sitting with these great apes. 15-year-old age minimum to track chimpanzees.

Masai Mara Game Reserve Part of the Serengeti ecosystem where herds of migrating wildebeests, zebras, and Thomson's gazelles cross these expansive short grass plains. Predators are also visible, including lion, leopard, and cheetah. Game drives in closed four-wheel-drive vehicles, walks, and ballooning.

Murchison Falls National Park Famous British explorers like John Speke once journeyed through this beautiful national park in search of the Nile. Vast plains are scattered with rich palm forests and lush grasslands. The river and delta is home to Nile crocodiles and rare shoebill storks, lions, Ugandan kobs, Rothschild's giraffes, hartebeests, oribis, buffaloes, and primates.

Ngorongoro Crater An ancient volcanic crater and self-contained ecosystem that sustains the greatest concentration of wildlife on earth: black rhinos, elephants, buffaloes, wildebeest, lions, hyenas, and cheetahs. Nearby is Olduvai Gorge, where Dr. Louis Leakey discovered a famous repository of prehistoric man.

Queen Elizabeth National Park A fantastic complement to other safari destinations with six species of monkeys, chimpanzee trekking, tree-climbing lions, elephants, hippos, warthogs, and leopards.

Ruaha National Park This park derives its name from the great Ruaha River which flows along its border. Wild, remote, and covered with baobab trees. Contains one of the largest elephant populations in Tanzania, as well as concentrations of hippos, crocodiles and large herds of buffaloes.

Selous Game Reserve The Selous Game Reserve is wild and rugged. The Rufiji River holds one of the highest densities of hippos and crocodiles. Its sand bars and forested banks provide an ideal habitat for birds. Stalk zebras, wildebeests, impalas, buffaloes, giraffes, lions, and elephants on foot. Portered walking with fly camps or thatched safari camps.

Serengeti National Park The Serengeti is famous for the annual Great Migration of millions of wildebeests and zebras, with predators in their wake. If you'd like to see one of nature's greatest phenomena, timing is everything. Every year is

slightly different, since the migration is dictated by weather. But, in general, the migration is in the Southern Serengeti in December through March, in the Western Serengeti June and July, and heads up to the Northern Serengeti and Masai Mara in June to November.

Tarangire National Park Reminiscent of old Africa, red elephants and baobab trees dot the landscape. In the dry season, clouds of migrating animals come down from the North to drink from the river – zebras, impalas, buffaloes, gazelles, Beisa oryxes, lesser kudus, gerenuks, Thomson's gazelles, and cheetahs.

Tsavo National Park Kenya's largest national park has an incredible diversity of game, including the Big Five. A sanctuary for the rare rhino. Reservoir lookouts for concentrated sightings of elephant herds, among others.

Volcanoes National Park Home to mountain gorillas, golden monkeys, blackfronted duikers, bushbucks, and buffaloes. The peaks of the Virunga Mountains, heavily forested extinct volcanoes, support several vegetation zones from lush bamboo stands to mountain forest to Afro-alpine. Trek 4-7 hours to sit with gorillas in their natural habitat. 15-year-old age minimum.

Zanzibar Explore Stone Town, the market, cathedrals, antique shops, and the Sultan's Palace Museum. Visit the famous Wwangooni caves. Relax on tranquil Indian Ocean beaches. End the afternoon with a spice tour.

Gabon, Loango National Park This is one of the few places in the world where you can see elephants and hippos swimming in the ocean and gorillas and turtles nesting on the beach. Excursions by open four-wheel-drive vehicle, by boat on the lagoon complex, and village visits on foot.

Ghana and Benin On the Cape coast of Ghana lies the town of Elmina and the haunting castle of St. George. In Benin lies the largest lake in Africa – Gamvie where you can witness an extraordinary voodoo ceremony.

Mali Once an ancient kingdom, Mali lies below the great Sahara Desert. From the medieval town of Mopti on the banks of the Niger River, you can explore the remote Dogon country and cliff dwellings, the massive mud mosque of Djenné, and the streets of legendary Timbuktu. Stay at a comfortable hotel in Mopti. Excursions are by closed four-wheel-drive vehicle and pirogue on the Niger River.

Yemen Visit the ancient kingdom of Sana'a, explore the city and the National Museum which contains antiquities and artifacts from several periods of Sana'a history, including glassware, pottery, statuary and figurines from the ancient kingdom of Cush. See frescoes and murals from ruined churches dating from the 8th to the 15th century of ancient Nubia's Christian period.

Sudan In Khartoum, the second largest city of Muslim North Africa, explore the city and the National Museum which contains antiquities and artifacts from several periods of Sudanese history, including glassware, pottery, statuary and figurines from the ancient kingdom of Cush. See frescoes and murals from ruined churches dating from the 8th to the 15th century of ancient Nubia's Christian period.

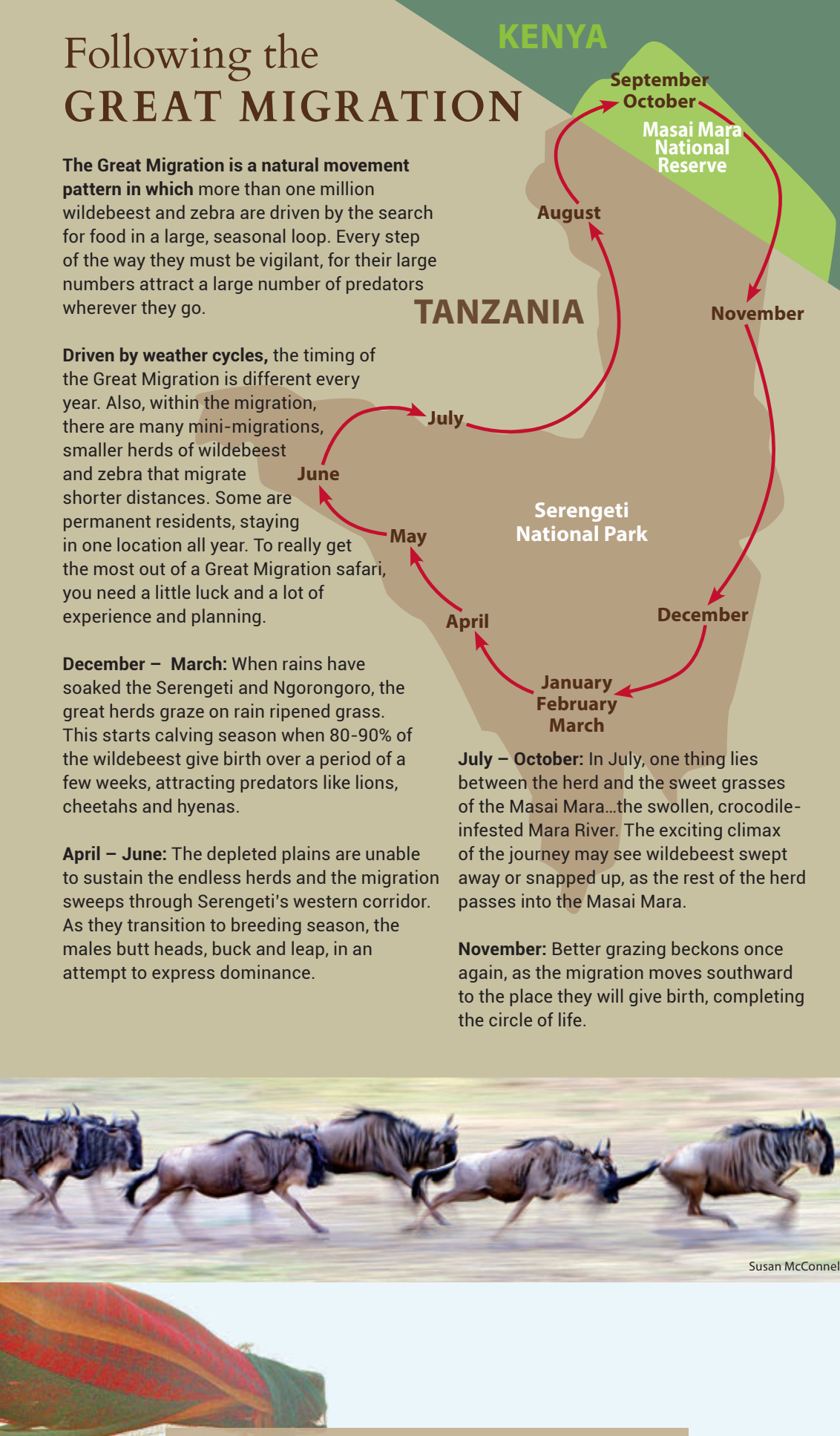

- Safari Lodge**
There are many different types of safari lodges in Africa, from comfortable rustic thatched bungalow-style residences to larger, hotel-style resorts. Size can vary from 12 to 100 beds and location can be in public or private concession areas.
- Permanent Tented Camp**
Luxury tented camps are set on a permanent foundation and are equipped with running water, flush toilets, and en-suite bathrooms. Interior décor can range from the simply staid to copper bathtubs, four poster beds, and red doors and screened windows that are built into the canvas walls. What you can count on in any tent is that you will surely hear the sounds of the African bush throughout the night!
- Mobile Tented Camp**
When you want to go where the action is, as with the Serengeti's Wildebeest Migration, a mobile tented camp is the perfect choice. This is not "camping" as most of us imagine. Tents are comfortably equipped with an en-suite (attached) bathroom at the rear, long drop loos and pulley showers as well as jets of hot and cold water delivered several times a day as



Following the GREAT MIGRATION

The Great Migration is a natural movement pattern in which more than one million wildebeest and zebra are driven by the search for food in a large, seasonal loop. Every step of the way they must be vigilant, for their large numbers attract a large number of predators wherever they go.

Driven by weather cycles, the timing of the Great Migration is different every year. Also, within the migration, there are many mini-migrations, shorter distances. Some are permanent residents, staying in one location all year. To really get the most out of a Great Migration safari, you need a little luck and a lot of experience and planning.

December – March: When rains have soaked the Serengeti and Ngorongoro, the great herds graze on rain ripened grass. This starts calving season when 80-90% of the wildebeest give birth over a period of a few weeks, attracting predators like lions, cheetahs and hyenas.

April – June: The depleted plains are unable to sustain the endless herds and the migration sweeps through Serengeti's western corridor. As they transition to breeding season, the males butt heads, buck and leap, in an attempt to impress dominance.

July – October: In July, one thing lies between the herd and the sweet grasses of the Masai Mara...the swollen, crocodile-infested Mara River. The exciting climax of the journey may see wildebeest swim away or snapped up, as the rest of the herd passes into the Masai Mara.

November: Better grazing beckons once again, as the migration moves southward to the place they will give birth, completing the circle of life.

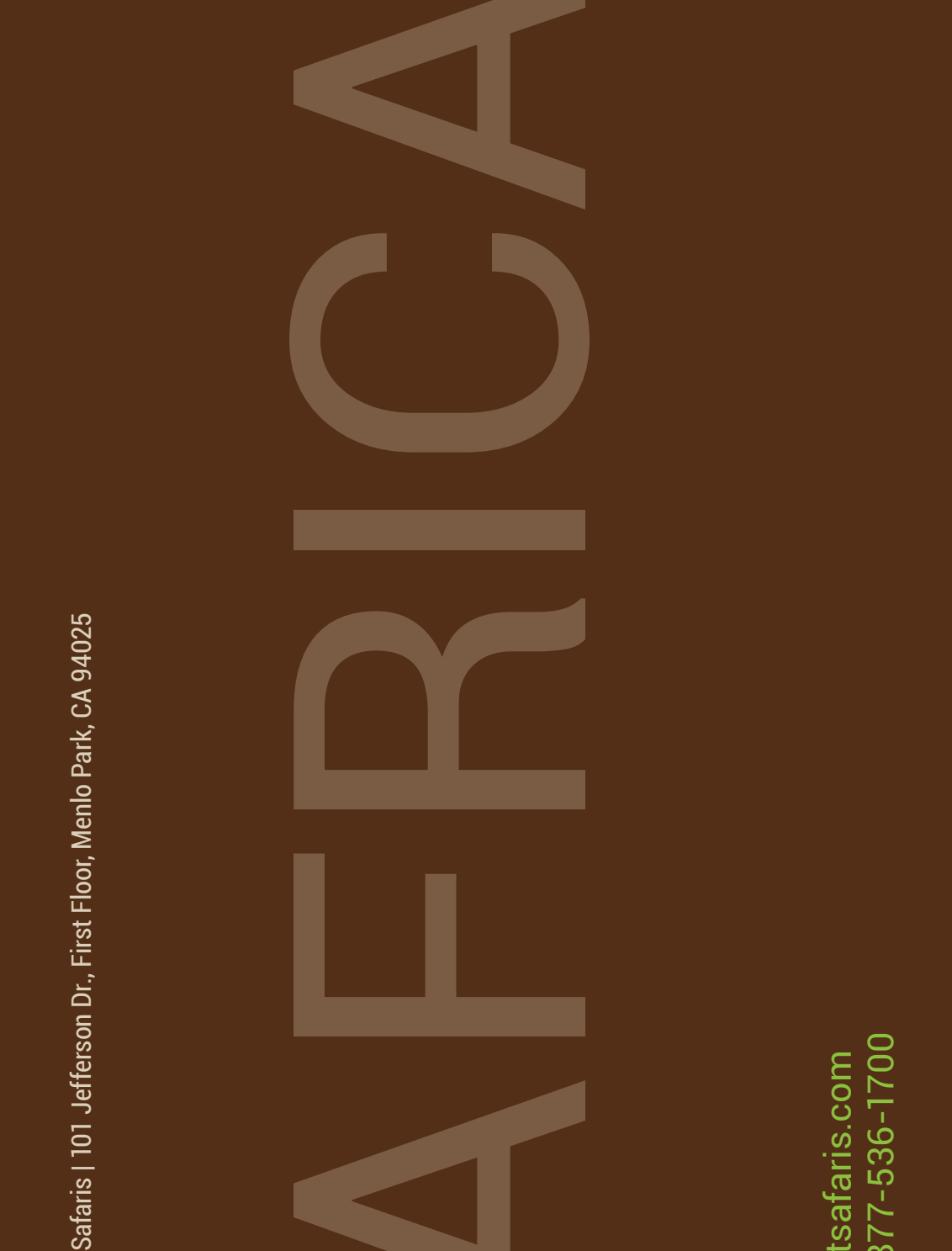


Following the Wildebeest Migration
